

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COVID-19 TESTS AT HUNTER STREET FOR TEACHERS AND STUDENTS

Please be aware that Liverpool City Council have a COVID-19 testing site available for students to use if they develop the 3 main covid symptoms. <https://www.gov.uk/get-coronavirus-test>

It is highly recommended that you “refresh” the page to ensure you see availability for testing at a **LOCAL** centre

Please note that this is only available for symptomatic individuals with the 3 main covid symptoms:-

- a high temperature – this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- a new, continuous cough – this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- a loss or change to your sense of smell or taste – this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal

If you need to order a home test for delivery please call 119

Individuals should try and access the national testing in the first instance.


If this isn't available the school testing kit should be used.

Dear Parent/Guardian,

Anti-Social Behaviour – Putting the Community First.

I would like to make you aware of a rise in incidents of anti-social behaviour in North Liverpool.

We have received complaints from the public regarding anti-social behaviour caused by youths on Walker's Playing Fields which is on Eaton Road, West Derby, Jennifer Avenue in Kirkdale and Rice Lane, Walton.

These incidents have included damage being caused, people being intimidated (including some who are elderly and vulnerable), wheelie bins being set on fire and people being injured after objects were thrown at them. Some of these incidents amount to criminal offences and will be treated as such.

Merseyside Police and Merseyside Fire and Rescue Service are working closely with schools in the area to monitor and appropriately tackle these issues.

I would like to point out that people who set fire to wheelie bin fires not only commit a criminal offences, but they may also be putting peoples safety at risk and are also a drain on council budgets and emergency service resources. Not only do such fires cause inconvenience for people, there is a charge by the council of £20 to replace them.

What you can do to help.....

- Make young people aware of the dangers of this type of behaviour and the impact it has on our local communities and their future.
- If you are responsible for a young person, ensure you know where they are and what they're doing whilst out.
- Keep wheelie bins locked away and out of sight. Remember that bins should also be away from property, particularly doorways and windows.
- Talk to us. If you have any information on these issues and you wish to pass on this information, you can do so anonymously via Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111 or on Merseyside Police social media platforms.
